Report on the 2022/23 ONN Annual General Meeting and the Education Program Meeting

The ONN Representatives met online on September 17, 2022. AGM ideas continued in a second meeting on Jan 14, 2023.

Most ONN member groups are now meeting in person though quite a few of them are using online formats for board/planning meetings.

People still love to see each other's work and it was thought that a fair or exhibit once every 3 years would work best. We could have displays of our work and possibly some vendors. The idea of a speaker was also floated. We are aiming for a show in Spring of 2024.

We have enough in the bank to cover immediate expenses and there is no fair/exhibit planned for 2023 so fees were again waived for 2023.

Member guilds were polled on the idea of hosting a fair and, while most were in favour of such an event, none said that they would host. This leaves the idea of a Spring 2024 fair in limbo.

Member groups are now circulating ideas to firm up exactly what could be expected at a fair, with the new format.

Next Annual Meeting will be Oct 14th, 2023 and it will be online.

We also had an Education meeting in November 2022 where groups each shared what kind of meetings they had during the pandemic. We talked about the difficulty of finding a good venue and the cost. We explored what kind of programs we had. That is, what we learned and who our teachers were. There were also good ideas about fun programming that was not strictly stitching focused. For instance: talking about finishing works, sharing our favorite textile stories, local or online (live) speakers, tools.

CANADIAN EMBROIDERERS' GUILD LONDON

Guild members have been keeping busy during these blustery winter days enjoying our monthly Zoom Gatherings with speakers such as Martina Celerin, a textile artist and scientist who grew up in London, ON and now lives in Bloomington, Indiana. She took our members on a virtual tour of her studio, showing her 3D woven tapestries and her supplies – containers of beads, discarded jewellery, bits of leather, hemp, wire, lace and other recycled or found items.

In February, Allie Davis and Roxane Shaughnessy of the Textile Museum of Canada gave members a tour through Double Vision – an exhibit of Nunavut artists Jessie Oonark (1906-1985) and her daughters, Janet Kigusiug (1926-2005) and Victoria Mamnguqsualuk, (1930-2016). The exhibit "shines a light on a highly distinctive art form called nivinngajuliaat that developed out of government-sponsored craft programs in the Arctic, beginning with the sewing program in Qamani'tuaq (Baker Lake) established in the 1960s."

Our guest speaker for March will be Hazel Monte, a textile artist from Seattle, Washington. Many thanks to our wonderful Speaker Series planning team for their inspired work. They enrich the experience of all our members.

March also sees the opening of our Summer Workshop registration to non-members. This year we are hosting workshops by Harriett Riddell (June 5 to June 7) and Bettina Matzkuhn (June 8 to June 10). The workshops are held at the John Labatt Visual Art Centre at Western University and the cost to non-members is \$300.00 per workshop. Bettina's workshop is currently full. There are only a few places available in Harriet's workshop, so don't delay.

Harriet is a Textile Performance Artist who travels the world with her sewing machine in challenging locations from the slums of Nairobi to the tea fields of the Himalayas. Through free motion embroidery she captures her surrounding environment and the people she meets. Her workshop is entitled "Free Motion Story Telling and Portraiture".

There will be time for playful activities with the sewing machine to loosen up, observational drawing exercises engaging the eye and mind. Participants will be focusing on portraiture, learning the rules of the face, and finding ways of incorporating words and details which make up a person and their personality. The workshop will then delve into storytelling and the many ways to tell a story with textile.







After a break for the holidays, SNG resumed its weekly meetings on Monday, January 9th. As always it was good to catch up with each other and see what members had been working on.



Seven of our members are registered to participate in the upcoming Embroiderers Association of Canada seminar and are therefore endeavoring to complete some of the unfinished projects on hand. We are very much looking forward to celebrate the 50 th anniversary of EAC from June 6-11 in Winnipeg Manitoba.

At our first evening meeting in March, eight of our members began participating in a round robin sampler. Members were to pick out their fabric, threads and any add ins such as beads and to complete the first band of stitching. The bags were then passed on with the only rules being that you must use ONLY the materials supplied and also record what stitch or stitches were used on each band. The bags will be passed on every 2 weeks to the next stitcher.

For our next upcoming programme at the end of April we have arranged for a therapeutic yoga instructor to work with us. She will be showing us some exercises for our hands to help keep them flexible and reduce
